Darlene Franklin Campbell, M.A., is an award-winning poet and novelist from southern Kentucky. She is also a first-grade teacher and a visual artist. She is proud of her Appalachian heritage and writes about the region and its people, not as an outsider looking in with romantic notions, but as one who has risen up out of the Kentucky soil with roots going 400 years deep, touching long-gone Scots-Irish settlers, Native American bloodlines, and Melungeon legends. In her spare time, Darlene is an avid disciple of martial arts and enjoys spending time with friends, family, and nature. Genealogy has been a passion for her since she first heard her father talk about her great-great-grandfather when she was nine.

Sarah Hamblin Kuchenbrod was born and raised in Danville and has a degree in Art History from UK. She became interested in genealogy from seeing the work her mother had done on her family tree. She had her DNA analyzed on *23andme*, *ancestryDNA*, and *Family Tree DNA* in an attempt to learn more about her father’s biological family, since he was adopted; she eventually found his biological family and met them. Along the way, she learned about genetic genealogy, and she loves sharing that information with others.

Helen Danser, from Tyner, Jackson County, Kentucky, is the Chair of the Kentucky Native American Heritage Commission. The Commission was established in 1996 to recognize and promote Native American contributions and influence in Kentucky’s history and culture. It serves as a clearinghouse for information for and about Native Americans in Kentucky.
